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



Canberra Montessori School RAP




- Partnership between school, parents and local First Nation community (Ngunnawal People)
- Started small and focused on their core work

- Grew from there and led to their inaugural RAP focused on activities:
 - In the classroom
 - Around the school
 - With the community

Carlton Football Club RAP

- Partnership between coaches, players, administrative staff, supporters and several First Nation communities
- Indigenous and non-Indigenous stakeholders were supportive, but instances of racism surfaced
- A unique opportunity surfaced (<u>play video</u>)
- RAP focused on:
 - Addressing historical wrongdoing
 - Connecting with local communities
 - Engaging with our fan base
 - Securing funding to grow

RESPECT Proactively demonstrate respect

LISTEN Listen deeply to the information you are receiving

THINK Think slowly about the activities you're planning

COMMONALITY Find common ground where benefits flow to all


VUNERABILITY Be open to sharing your fears and concerns
